

#### DCMGA Board Meeting — July 16, 2014 by Bonnie Rankin

The meeting was called to order at 5:30 pm.

Secretary's Report – Motion was made and seconded to approve the May 21, 2014 minutes. Motion approved.

**Correspondence** –We received two thank you notes. The first was from the Outagamie County Master Gardeners for our contribution to the conference and the other from Northern Door YMCA for a presentation Kathie gave.

**Treasurers Report** – Martha reported on plant sale and open house proceeds and expenditures as well as overall financials. A motion to approve the treasurer's report was made and seconded. Motion approved.

#### Old Business -

<u>Outreach</u> – Dora Leonardson gave a synopsis of the program. She reported that we had no volunteer responses to applications, nor any additional applications. A discussion was held regarding the best way to communicate and get responses to the program. A decision was reached, whereby Dora will make a change to the Outreach tab for members to volunteer for hours that are available and need filling. Groups or organizations requesting help will be directed to the "forms" location for the appropriate form to complete.

Committee Chair Reports – Every Chair will be reminded again to complete a listing/instruction on the tasks they complete.

<u>Pedestrian Counter</u> – The counter has been installed and is working. Thank you, Alan Romsos, for your assistance. There is a clipboard in the shed for the dates and numbers before and after events to help keep counts. Alan suggested that we cover the counter during events attended primarily by MG's (e.g., Weed & Feed) as an easy way to maintain counts aside from such events.

<u>Taste Team</u> – Linda Zolnosky and Linda Lambert have volunteered to take over responsibility for the "Taste". They will be working with The Hendersons over the next few months to learn the ropes.

<u>History Update</u> – Mike completed and distributed a draft covering the history of the organization. If anyone has any additions, please let him know. What we have to date will be added to the website. The written historical information will be housed at the extension office.

<u>Volunteer Agreement</u> – The document is nearly ready to give to Matt; however there are a few people who still need to sign. Kathie will contact those members.

The Garden Door Signage - Tim will work on this.

#### **New Business-**

<u>Youth Program</u> – A discussion was held on how to manage the Youth Program and what form it should take. We have a lack of volunteers to help with the program in its current format. This will be tabled until the October meeting.

#### **Board Meeting Minutes** (continued)

<u>TGD - Botanical Garden?</u> - A brief discussion was held regarding calling TGD a "botanical garden". A motion was made and seconded to leave the name as it is. Motion carried.

<u>Entry to TGD</u> – A committee headed by Jeanne Vogel with members Allen Miller, Chris Gritzmacher and Sandie Ott will work on the best way to direct visitors to TGD after entering PARS from Highway 42.

<u>Nominating Committee</u> – A committee is needed to work on vacancies which will be coming up; i.e. President, Treasurer and Board openings. Mike volunteered to chair the committee. Rod Bohn and Jan Ziemann volunteered to help.

<u>Awards Committee</u> – A suggestion was made to set up criteria for awards. Kerry Vavra, Martha Burris and Allen Miller volunteered to take this on.

<u>By-Laws Update</u> – Mike provided a draft of proposed by-law changes. They were discussed by the Board. A motion was made to accept the draft with proposed changes. Motion seconded and carried. A copy will be sent to the State for their approval and then presented to the membership at the annual meeting.

<u>Annual Picnic</u> – Because of busy summer schedules and also to allow new members to have an additional month to get their volunteer hours in, the annual picnic will be held later. September 20<sup>th</sup> was the date chosen. The Social Committee will be asked to chair.

<u>QR Codes</u> – Codes have been added to DCMGA.org, Trip Advisor and TGD information sheets. Trip Advisor will be taken off the home page of the website.

<u>Phase 2 Pavers</u> – Tim received an updated estimate on the paver project. A decision was made to hold on further expenditure on this program for this year.

<u>Conifer Garden</u> – Dick Allmann presented a plan for east of the entrance to TGD. The new area would have a 24" high center with 12-18" outside and contain small slow growing conifers. The soil, rocks and mulch would be added this year and the conifers next year. It was a consensus of the Board to generally support the project but more information was requested, e.g., a second estimate and details on plants and costs.

#### Committee Reports:

Education Committee – Summer tours are set, a fall seminar is in place and 2 programs are scheduled for January.

<u>Garden Door</u> – Since installation of the pavers, we assumed responsibility for mowing the lawn. A suggestion was made to organize a team to rotate mowing duties. Bill Freyman has a mower he will donate to the organization.

#### Announcements:

Budget Reminder – Area budgets are due to Martha by August 15.

The next meeting will be held September 17<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 p.m.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting. Meeting adjourned at 8:05 pm.

# The Garden Door Committee Meeting July 14, 2014

Call to Order: Tim called the meeting to order at 5:28.

T-Shirts: Tim and others thanked Jim McFarlin and Chris G. for the T-shirts. They look great!

Plant Labels: Tim thanked Sandie for printing the labels, and area supervisors for labeling their plants.

**Mulch:** Tim noted that we had 45 yards of mulch delivered this year – 15 more than last year. We have about three yards left. No-one thought we need more than that.

**Fence Removal:** Tim thanked Jim M. and Kerry V. for removing the fence and filling the post holes. Several people commented on how the fence removal, edging, planting and mulching make the garden look much better.

Rain Barrel: No rain barrel will be installed. Jim M. said there is no suitable place to put one.

**Coordinators for the Taste of the Garden Door:** Tim was pleased to announce that Linda Lambert and Linda Zolnosky have volunteered to be the coordinators for the Taste. They will "job shadow" Doug and Barbara Henderson for the upcoming event, and will take over leadership next year.

Wind Chime: Tim thanked Wendy for the wonderful new wind chime that graces the tunnel.

**Open House:** The Open House was a big success. We had 289 visitors this year, up from 200 last year. Vicki gave the financial report. Allen, Kathie and Tim talked about visitors' favorable comments. Wendy said several people told her she needed a microphone. Vicki said there was significant interest in aids for comfortable gardening.

#### The Garden Door Committee Meeting (continued)

**Entrance Garden:** The Allmanns presented their proposal to construct a two foot high berm and install miniature conifers just east of the entrance arbor. This would involve a 17 x 14 foot area. Rocks of different sizes and types would be part of the design. Richard Briggs would bring in the rocks and 18 yards of topsoil, and would build the berm for \$1,860. In the spring we would spend an additional \$800 for conifers. To enable people to touch the plants there would be access from the main interior path opposite the roses. Allen said he likes the idea, but he thinks our priority should be phase II of the pavers. The proposal will be discussed at the board meeting.

**Pedestrian Counter:** Tim announced that Alan Romsos successfully installed the counter. In the shed there is a clipboard to tally numbers from the counter. We need a volunteer pedestrian tracker and backup people. Most days the count would be accurate, but the numbers for special events could be high due to some people going in and out multiple times.

**Irrigation System:** Tim will ask Jason Rass if he needs backup people for operating the irrigation system. Most leaks have been resolved. The Station pump is not working properly, but it is being fixed. Jim B. asked if we can get hose guards. The problem is with people tripping over them. Kerry can put a splitter on the water line serving the Garden Next Door. He and Jim B. will talk.

**Paver Status:** Everyone is delighted with the new pavers. Regarding phase II of the paver project, Tim discussed his meeting with Lars. He hopes he will have estimates from Lars to present at the Board meeting on Wednesday. The basic idea is to have narrower secondary pathways, and possibly install pavers that imitate flagstone in the Shade Garden, Butterfly Garden and pergola. Flagstone will remain in the dome.

**TGD Public Signage on PARS Property:** Tim said better signage is needed to get visitors to TGD and not Research Station areas such as parking lots, buildings, and grapes. Jeanne Vogel will chair a sign committee. Others volunteering to serve on the committee include Tim K., Sandie Ott, Allen M. and Chris G.

**Expense Form:** Jim M. advised area supervisors that they can find an expense form on the main Members Only page under TGD Area. It is for tracking your budget and expenses.

**Raised Beds:** DD is developing a plan to replace the raised beds next spring. Jeanne Vogel will work with DD on this. Additional volunteers are needed. Subjects for consideration may include: (1) re-configuring the children's area, (2) the shade from the arbor vitae, (3) planting a living fence on the west side, (4) camouflaging the pump and hose, (5) working around the new path, (6) transitioning into adjacent gardens, (7) enhancing the view of the espalier, and (8) maintaining access to bring things into the garden for events. People should send their suggestions or concerns to DD. She hopes to bring a proposal to the Sept. meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 7:10. The next meeting will be Sept. 8th.

#### **Open House at The Garden Door**

The 2014 Open House on July 12<sup>th</sup> celebrated the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of The Garden Door. Many MGV's helped at the event wearing the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary T-shirts (in green) or the previous Garden Door T-shirts (in blue). More importantly, 289 visitors showed up to see the gardens, attend educational mini-seminars lead by MGV's, or talk with MGV's about gardening and TGD gardens. The mini-seminars and demonstrations were on the following topics: Gorgeous Containers, Fairy Gardens, Birds in the Garden, Straw Bale Gardening, Picking Squash Flowers to Eat, How to Prune Tomatoes, Where Are the Monarchs?, Impatiens Downy Mildew, and Aids for Comfortable Gardening. The Open House also included a 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary photo display and the ever-popular tours of the Peninsular Agricultural Research Station by tractor-drawn wagon. This year's Open House also made a limited but tasty selection of food available for sale in TGD. It was the best deal in town according to some! Our new paver path around the entire Garden Door and the new pop-up tents made their public debut at the Open House and were appreciated by all.

This was a great event enjoyed by both the visitors and the MGV's. Many people commented that it was relaxed and provided opportunities for people to have meaningful conversations about gardens, plants, and gardening methods. We all learned something during this pleasant afternoon in The Garden Door.

With lots of "green shirts" around, nearly all questions could be answered.









#### July Days to Remember — with Thanks

On July 9<sup>th</sup> in the late afternoon, about 20 MGV's converged at The Garden Door (TGD) for a "Weed and Feed" to get the place tidied up before the Open House on July 12<sup>th</sup>. In addition to weeding, dead-heading and pruning, the MGV's also installed tons of mulch in and around the gardens and quarry wash in a few areas. We were able to spruce up the gardens in a few hours and then enjoy the refreshments in the gazebo overlooking the beautified area.

Those gardens stayed beautiful and were enjoyed by over 200 visitors to TGD Open House three days later.

Two days after the Open House, at about 10 pm, a localized severe hailstorm blew through Sevastopol township and dumped hail for about 45 minutes, seriously damaging experimental plantings at the Peninsular Agricultural Research Station (PARS), and farm crops and orchards in the area. The hail, estimated at 1.5-2 inches in diameter, formed banks that resembled snow. Worse, it beat down on the grape vines, fruit trees, winter wheat, and corn crops. It stripped foliage from plants and fruit trees, ripped down corn stalks, shredded vegetable plants, and battered fruits and vegetables. Although the cherry crop was less damaged, a 10 acre portion of a local apple orchard was severely damaged.

Although of significantly less value than the PARS experimental plantings or commercial crops, The Garden Door plants and art were also damaged by the hail. Vegetable plots in the Garden Next Door (GND) were also severely damaged. Within two weeks of the storm, however, it was apparent that most of our plants will probably survive. Many are started to sprout and grow again. Although seeing the damage to our showcase gardens was initially shocking, it is clear that we have much to be grateful for, as demonstrated by the resilience of the plants in the gardens. Following the storm, many visitors to TGD and GND commented on how beautiful it had been during the Open House and wished us continued success. We are also grateful to friends who donated plants to help us replace damaged plants to provide veggies for the Taste of TGD. We thank Larry Maas, who donated not only the original plants but the replacement plants after the hail for the big pot in the Succulent Garden at TGD. Continued thanks to all the MGV's who devote time and effort to maintain TGD gardens and GND plots through sun or hail.

#### Tours, Tours and More Tours

The DCMG's have had a busy touring schedule this summer. The Class of 2014 with a few long-time MG's opened their gardens to us on two consecutive Sunday afternoons.

The "South" tour on July 20<sup>th</sup> included stops at gardens owned by Nancy Anschutz, Alan and Shirley Romsos, Debbie Olsonoski, Tricia and Mike Hanson, Vickie Daoust, Bonnie Rankin and Chriss Daubner. It was a beautiful day to see gardens that ranged from peaceful shady groves to a sunny meadow to attract butterflies.

The "Central" tour on July 27<sup>th</sup> included gardens tours hosted by Mark and Pam Honold, Carol Connelly, Nancy Santoriello, Brian Bergee, Barb Henkelmann, Mary Moster, Dale and Jean Jeanquart, and Barb and Doug Henderson. Beginning warm and sunny and ending cool and rainy, we saw a diversity of gardens and environments that made each special. Goodies provided by the hosts kept us well fed and Nancy had a guess-the-species plant quiz with Door Peninsula Winery wines as prizes.

All of the hosts gave us interesting and informative insights into the plant selections, experiences, challenges and successes in each of the gardens. We felt welcomed and appreciate all of the effort that goes into making both a garden and a tour of the garden. Thank you for sharing your gardens and experiences with us! Special thanks to Kerry Vavra who organized the garden tours and provided us with detailed maps and directions to each place on the tours. We would have been lost without them!

On July 24<sup>th</sup> eight DCMG's traveled to Solaris Farms, a nursery owned by the Bremer family (Nate, Kim, Emma and Ethan), that offers unique, hardy, field grown perennials selected to grow in the upper Midwest climate. It is located on a century-old farmstead north of Reedsville, about 20 miles south of Green Bay. They specialize in Hemerocallis (daylilies), Paeonia (peonies) and Lilium (true lilies), which were an intoxicatingly fragrant color palate display on the day of our tour. Solaris Farms is also an American Hemerocallis Society Display Garden, with over 3000 daylily cultivars, many of which were hybridized on site by Nate. Hearing about how he propagates the lilies and the time involved was a highlight of the tour. Cultivars can be purchased as freshly dug bare root plants after viewing them in the ground at Solaris Farms or via their internet site.

On July 30<sup>th</sup>, about 50 DCMG's and guests toured Meissner Landscape, Inc.'s operation located on County T in Door County. This was an extension of Greg Meissner's educational program on professional landscape design sponsored by the DCMGA in February 2014. We also were able to tour Greg and Marsha Meissner's home gardens that included a spectacular display of large and gorgeous hostas. Some hosta plants were 30 years old!



Visitors on the July 20th garden tours strolled through a shaded garden (left), discussed the gardens (lower middle), relaxed in the shade (upper middle) and learned about gardens to attract butterflies (right).















Visitors on the July 27th tour saw extensive fruit and vegetable gardens (upper left), beach house flower displays (upper middle), organic gardens in town (upper right), and a town garden with many specimens including a wall of hops (middle and lower lower left). We were welcomed to the many gardens of Dale and Joan Jeanquart (middle right) and saw gardens at two Bay-side residences that showed how well plants can grow on rocky bluff soil with a gardener's touch (lower middle and right ).















On July 30th, about 50 MG's and their guests got a guided tour by Greg Meissner of Meissner Landscape, Inc.'s facilities (above left). It included a stroll through the Meissners' distinctive home landscaping (above center and right) that features an herb garden, many specimen plants, and more hosta cultivars than many of us had ever seen in one place. ## "Garden Field Day" in Green Bay on August 7, 2014


