

DCMGA Board Meeting – May 15, 2013 By Wendy Woldt

Board Members Present: Carol Berglund, Kathie Vavra, Jim McFarlin, Martha Burris, Michelle Kemp, and Wendy Woldt.

Also Present: Rod Bohn, Allen Miller, Jan Ziemann, Christine Gritzmacher

Meeting called to order at 5:30 pm. Motion to approve the minutes of March 13th meeting was offered by Jim McFarlin and seconded by Carol Berglund. Motion approved.

Correspondence. Kathy received a note from the Crossroads thanking us for our support.

Treasurer's Report. Martha reviewed the budget and the report was approved.

Old Business

Outreach discussion. Jim and Kathie talked about projects that are funded and projects that are volunteered for without funding. These projects must be approved in order to claim volunteer hours. Everyone agreed that they should coincide with our mission statement with education at the forefront. There are 6 recognized projects right now: Government Center, Heritage Center, John Miles Park, Community Gardens, the Library dirt project co-chaired by Kathie and Lee Somerville, and the Youth Gardens. Volunteer projects that have asked for MG support this year are Noble House, Boy Scouts Merit Badge, Child Care of Sister Bay, the YMCA, and the Land Trust yard. Michelle said she does work for the Ellison Bay sign and 47 planting barrels and Gary Kemp does work controlling invasive species at Penn Park that they use for volunteer hours. Rod mentioned that, if funded, a project was voted on and approved. Jan suggested that the proposals should all come in by a deadline so that they can all be considered for approval by the Board at one meeting. Allen suggested making an application form for the web site. Christine said she would work on making a form to go on the web site and bring it to the next meeting. Kathie brought up the Barron County MGs guidelines as a model for the form.

The Garden Door Kathie said she would get with Barb Allmann for an updated list of supervisors for the Garden Door.

Request It was mentioned that Judy Thompson wanted a volunteer be at a demonstration tent at Crickets, a garden store, during the Jazz on Jefferson event in Sturgeon Bay, on the same day as our Open House. Everyone thought it would be hard to work in due to our own event that day.

The Plant Sale There was discussion on pricing the donated unmarked perennials. Jan suggested making a Potpourri Perennials area to be priced, but not too cheaply, simply because we do not know the plant's name.

New Business

Communication Jim talked about having trouble getting into the Google group without going to a computer, having some trouble with Apple products. Kathie said she would check into it.

DCMGA Board Meeting Minutes (continued)

The Garden Door Jim had a line repaired going from the falls to the pump that was leaking in the pond area. He had Waterscapes do it and it is working much better. He has not gotten a bill yet, but will send it to Martha when he does.

State Association Report. Rod reported that they would have face-to-face meetings. He said they would have two meetings per year now. The next meeting will be Aug. 16 – 17 in Janesville discussing industry in gardening. The other meetings planned are March 28 – 29, 2014 in Outagamie County and July 31—Aug 1 2014 in La Crosse.

Committee Reports

Kathie mentioned that they had great volunteers for the Youth projects.

The Garden Door Spring Clean up was a huge success with many volunteers. Many thanks go out to the new class for all their help.

There was discussion on delivery of port-a-potty. One will be coming in mid-May and stay till the end of September and a second one will be delivered for the Taste of the Garden Door event.

Sandie has ordered the banners. Kathie will make sure the ad is in The Advocate for the Plant Sale. Jim is going to work on getting “Open” signs at the entrance to the Research Station for the Garden Door sign and one for the sign in The Garden Door parking lot. Jim was also going to check on getting a big “sale” flag for the plant sale. There was some discussion about revamping the sign by the parking lot as well.

Badges for the 2013 training class will be handed out at the picnic on June 23 at The Garden Door.

Garden Door Notes

Garden Door Committee Meeting, May 13, 2013

Present: Barb and Dick Allmann (co-chairs), Vicki Dirst, Allen Miller, Jim McFarlin, Jim Friedrichs, Chris Gritzmacher, Wendy Woldt, DD Knutson

Call to order: Dick called the meeting to order at 5:32.

Open House: Vicki reported on plans for the Open House. Sandie ordered the banners and put up a display in the library. A handout has been prepared for distribution at the Plant Sale. Jim M. and Vicki will do the radio program on June 20th (10:20-11:00 am) to publicize the Open House. The list of programs and presenters was discussed. DD offered to do a mini-program on the raised beds, and her offer was accepted.

Area Supervisor Reports:

DD said the raised beds need more soil -- at least nine large bags. Wendy offered composted and sifted horse manure from her farm on Idlewild Road. The pile is behind the old barn. The manure plus a few bags of potting soil should take care of the raised beds. A volunteer is needed to haul the manure to the garden.

Allen said the tables and benches for the garden are done, except for a spray finish. He also reported that Phil Block has offered us a special price on tools from Fiskars. Allen would like to get some new tools for the shed, but is not sure his \$150 budget will cover it. Wendy said she has put tools of hers in the shed. Barb suggested selling some of the old tools at the Plant Sale. Also, it was recommended that we get a first aid kit for the shed.

Barb said the Hendersons reported to her that the knot garden will be much the same as last year, while the only change in the spiral garden will be additional tufas.

Chris noted that she got a lot of help with the rose garden at the cleanup. She again sought advice on how to control runoff that causes the mulch to move where it is not wanted. Wendy offered rocks from her place. Jim F. thought rocks from the research station could be used if we get their permission. A volunteer (or two) is needed to help haul rocks and install them.

Garden Door Committee Meeting (continued)

Other Discussion:

Barb said she really appreciated all the new people helping with the cleanup. She gave the Henderson's report on the status of the Taste, identifying planned advertising, sponsors, judges, and rental tents. Vicki commented on the status of the recognition board. Sally Everhardus has completed the engraved portraits. Allen will finish them and mount them on the board on the shed prior to the Plant Sale.

The meeting adjourned at 6:10. The next meeting will be July 8th.

The Garden Door Spring Cleanup 2013

Yes, it was originally scheduled for April 20th but it had to be delayed for one week due to excessive moisture (the truck could not get in to deliver mulch) and a few snow drifts still in the garden. The compost area was marked behind the western tree line and the mulch was delivered by the cleanup day on April 27th when many DCMG volunteers showed up to dig and prune. We had a beautiful sunny day and pleasant temperatures (finally!) and we were even happier to have the company of so many fellow MG's, particularly members of the 2013 class, who enthusiastically weeded, clipped, raked and hauled debris to the compost pile and brought mulch to the gardens. Within a few hours, the results were plainly evident and The Garden Door was ready to start growing again.

Education Committee:



**“Small Projects to Fix Big Problems”
Presented by Jason Feldman on April 16, 2013**

Jason Feldman presented an informative and entertaining discussion of “Small Projects to Fix Big Problems” in landscapes. Jason began by showing us his nine favorite gardening tools and telling us the uses and benefits of each. Next, he advised to “have a plan” before starting on a project, which includes thoroughly identifying the problem, making a map and taking pictures of the site, and seeking advice to arrive at a suitable solution. Jason reviewed landscape design principles and stressed the importance of understanding a project’s cost before starting a project, as well as understanding how the landscape will be maintained when the project is completed. He cautioned against impulse buys that may not fit into the completed landscape. He showed examples of this Problem/Solution approach as it was used in several of his landscaping projects. These included a simple permanent stone seating area that looked like it had always been part of the existing natural landscape, an ingenious raised and movable vegetable garden for a small space, an expanded parking area that used newly engineered driveway products to integrate the new parking space into the landscape, and a cost-effective water feature combined with plantings to emulate the feeling of a stream bed. MG's Hike the Shivering Sands Complex

On May 18th, DC Master Gardeners and their guests were lead by Carl Scholz on hikes through three portions of the Shivering Sands Wetlands Complex off of Glidden Drive. Shivering Sands is a 3,400-acre complex that includes dunes, kettles, bogs, fens, beaches, lakes and forests, including perhaps Wisconsin's largest cedar swamp. The Nature Conservancy owns and manages part of the complex. The diversity of plants and wildlife there is remarkable and we saw many examples of it in early spring splendor on a sunny afternoon. Our first stop was at a Nature Conservancy trail that crosses over a stream near the spot where it disappears underground on its way to Lake Michigan. Our second stop was at a Lake Michigan beach that held pebbles demonstrating Door Peninsula's geologic past. Our third stop was overlooking the Shivering Sands Creek that drains from Dunes Lake and into Lake Michigan. Our final stop, for those whose schedules permitted, was at Carl's home where he and Ruth provided refreshments, conversation and great bird viewing.

Thanks to Carl for giving us an enjoyable and educational introduction to one of Wisconsin's Five Star Natural Areas!

Specialty items, such as plants for Fairy Gardens, were also sold (lower right).

OUTREACH Volunteer Efforts By Kathie Vavra

In the past, DCMGA volunteers who assist with projects or programs in the community related to gardening sometimes included those volunteer hours to fulfill part of their volunteer effort requirements to maintain MGA membership. There are many opportunities available in Door County (and elsewhere) that we are not familiar with and the DCMGA Board has been asked to consider how such "outreach" volunteer work should be treated relative to DCMGA volunteer hours. That is, what type of outreach volunteer work should count for DCMGA recognition and how can we evaluate such efforts if we are unfamiliar with the sponsoring organization or project? Therefore, the Board requested more information from the members about their outreach efforts, if they are intended to be included in our statement of volunteer hours.

When considering a request for support of outreach projects or programs by DCMG volunteers, please focus on our Mission and keep in mind that our primary goals are education and stewardship. Our Mission Statement is:

The Door County Master Gardeners Association, Inc., in partnership with the UW-Extension, shall strive to make a positive impact on horticulture in our community through education, community outreach, and stewardship of our environment.

We also want to avoid "burn-out" of MG's who may feel overwhelmed by work requests. One suggestion was to limit our support to a maximum of two years. Think about it. "Burn-out" is a very real and overwhelming consideration.

At the May 15th Board meeting we had a lengthy discussion about outreach and other volunteer areas. To sum up the discussion, Brian Holtz is in charge of approving or disapproving of volunteer hours to count for DCMGA reporting purposes. We will have two types of Outreach: one type that requires DCMGA funding, and another that is limited to support based on approved volunteer hours for MGA reporting. Christine Gritzmacher will draft a form that will be required to request support for funded outreach programs (based on a model for funded programs used by the Barron County MGA). Funded programs will need Board approval.

Notice of **all** outreach areas would be greatly appreciated. They can be used in the annual report to the state MGA, extension office and research station stats. A photo of each project site and a job description that includes the names of all MGs involved, will be posted on the website under outreach information (dcmga.org). All outreach efforts need a lead coordinator and volunteers. We will advertise for volunteers: under the WANT ADS-Help Needed section of the dcmga.org website, by newsletter, in group e-mails, and Google Groups. If we don't get volunteers, the project will not "fly". Brian has to approve all activities for the volunteer efforts to be recognized as DCMGA volunteer hours for reporting purposes.

Please look at the Outreach tab on DCMGA.org where funded programs should appear on the base page. Now only the Heritage Garden at Crossroads is depicted there. In the future, we intend to list the volunteer programs divided by separate tabs, for northern and southern Door County, to assist people in locating projects that are conveniently located near them. Each area should have a picture with the garden in full bloom, a description and the volunteer MG's names who participated.

At the Board meeting on July 17 we'll finalize this discussion. Please plan to attend the meeting to participate in this discussion or send your thoughts on this issue to Kathie Vavra via email.

Youth Program Gardens Planted

Our Youth program at the Garden Next Door was held on May 29th. The weather cooperated to allow 54 third graders from the Sevastopol, St. Peters and St. John Bosco schools to plant six vegetable plots. We planted potatoes, the “Three Sisters” (beans, corn and squash), four root vegetables, Brussels sprouts, tomatoes, A LOT of squash and other pioneer veggies! The garden plots were prepared the day before with mounds and rows thanks to Jim McFarlin, Kerry Vavra, Deborah Javurek, Vicki Dirst and Kathie Vavra.

MG volunteers arrived by 7:30 am on the day of the event to help set up and fill snack bags. The night crawler races, worm farm and “Potatoes 101” were really fun! The first “weed and water” event will be on July 10. We want to involve the families throughout the summer. This is an anthology of Jen Jensen's (1860-1951) most significant, yet lesser-known, articles including "The Saturday Evening Post" article, March, 1930.

The article ends with this question..."I am wondering what new knowledge they have reaped this summer to carry home that will be for the betterment of that home environment?"


